THC Edibles Facts

What are edibles?

Edibles are food products that have been infused with marijuana. These products come in forms that include:

- baked goods
- candies
- gummies
- chocolates
- lozenges
- beverages

Unfortunately, many people who consume edibles are unaware of the dangers associated with their use.

What are the risks?

Unknown strength:

- Edible potency is difficult to measure; regulations for labeling and manufacturing are moderate, at best.
- Dosage estimates are imprecise.
- Many do not know how much THC they are consuming.

Longer-lasting effects:

- Effects typically last three hours.
- Effects can last much longer depending on the amount consumed.

Overdose potential:

- One difference between smoking marijuana and consuming edibles is effect time.
- It can take from 30 minutes to two hours for effects to occur, making overdose a real concern.

Side Effects

- Drowsiness, agitation, and/or confusion
- Anxiety and panic attacks
- Vomiting
- Hallucinations, paranoia, and/or psychotic episodes
- Respiratory depression
- Heart problems*
- Impaired motor ability
- *Eight percent of emergency room visitors who consumed edibles had irregular heartbeats.

Edible Appearance

- Look like common baked goods, candies, and beverages
- Designed in a way that appeals to youth
- Labeling may indicate THC, but when unwrapped it may be mistaken for normal food

Where do they come from?

- Can be purchased in stores throughout Virginia, including New Kent County
- Businesses may not offer for sale or sell an edible or inhaled product containing THC to a person younger than 21 years of age
- Businesses may not offer for sale or sell an edible or inhaled product containing THC unless the product is clearly packaged and labeled as containing THC
- THC edibles may also be purchased online

What are the legal and school consequences for posession, consumption, and distribution of edibles?

- Anyone under the age of 21 is prohibited from possessing, consuming, or distributing edibles, and face a criminal charge of possession, consumption, or distribution of a controlled substance.
- New Kent County Public Schools' Code of Conduct issues a 10-day out-of-school suspension for the possession, consumption, and/or distribution, with the possibility of a longer-term suspension and/or change of placement for these violations.
- The New Kent Sheriff's Department is notified of and processes all NKCPS THC possessions, distributions, and consumptions.
